

CONFERENCE FEEDBACK 2010

From 12-14 January 2010, the annual EASA conference was hosted by the School of Educational Sciences, Faculty of Humanities, Vaal Triangle Campus, North-West University. EASA has a history of excellent conferences and the Vaal Triangle Campus perpetuated this tradition in style. The conference took place at Quest Conference Centre in Vanderbijlpark and was well attended (154 delegates registered). Conference delegates included representatives from Departments of Education, academics and researchers (from 13 Higher Education Institutions in South Africa, one in Botswana, and one in Mozambique), students, and practitioners (principals and teachers). The mix of delegates appositely reflected the conference theme: Partnerships in Education: **Research and Practice.**



Researchers from all over South Africa and from neighbouring African countries presented papers that highlighted the crucial need for partnerships between universities, schools, communities and government in order to transform education in our country and in Africa. The theme of partnerships was thoroughly unpacked in a diversity of papers that included titles such as 'University and provincial education districts in concert for sustainable empowering learning environments' (SMG Mahlomaholo) to 'Care for us, do not merely control us: Partnering with learners in the quest for psychological well-being in schools' (AE Kitching & V Roos) to 'The influence of management practices on effective collaboration and partnerships with teachers' (B Grobler & R Mestry).

Prof Michael Ungar (Dalhousie University, Canada) and Prof Jean Baxen (Rhodes University) provided the keynote addresses. Michael's keynote, 'Pathways to

Resilience: How Collaboration between Educators, Mental Health Counselors, Child Welfare Workers and Correctional Officers Help Young People Thrive', provided evidence of the benefits of partnerships and urged expanded understanding of, and commitment to, multiand transdisciplinary partnerships.

There was loud praise from the conference delegates for the expert and elegant organization of the EASA conference 2010.
